



 - Gulf of Aqaba







- Entire Old Testament history takes place in this half-circle of land

- Equals about 1/3 of the land area of the continental United States




- 1,000 miles from Egypt to the Northern tip of the Persian Gulf

The Story Begins

- God gave man his first home

The Story Begins


- Adam and Eve sinned and were driven from the Garden
- Cain killed Abel and was driven away from his family
 - Dwelt in the land of Nod east of Eden (location unknown)
- Population grew and the people went their separate ways
- Almost nothing is told to us concerning this early period

The Story Begins

- Flood wiped out all traces of life
 - Archaeologists have been unable to uncover information from that era
- Many years passed in the first five chapters of Genesis
 - At least 1656 years from creation to the flood
- Mankind becomes so wicked God wants to destroy all!


Noah

- God offered him and his family a way of escape




Noah

Plain of Shinar




- Mountains of Ararat are high and rugged the people moved down the slopes to the rich valley between the rivers
- At Shinar they decided to build a city including a tower

Plain of Shinar



- The "tower of Babel"
- Hoped the tower would keep them from scattering everywhere
- God told them to multiply and replenish the earth
- God confused their language because of their disobedience

Sons of Noah Japheth



Sons of Noah Shem, Ham, Japheth

JAPHETH

- Remote from the Bible story
- Ararat marked the approximate southern boundary
- Moved north of the Caspian Sea and Black
 Sea to the edge of modern day Russia
- Moved west into the northern half of Asia Minor into Greece, Italy and to Spain

Sons of Noah Shem, Ham, Japheth

JAPHETH

- Probably had the island of Cyprus also
- To the east they formed the peoples later known as the Medes, the Persians, and the Parthians
 - Most of us would likely come through Japheth
 - European tribes developed from his descendants

Sons of Noah Ham



Sons of Noah Shem, Ham, Japheth

HAM

- Played an early role in the history of the Mesopotamian valley
- Nimrod given credit for establishing a very early empire in Babylon that reached north to include Nineveh

Sons of Noah Shem, Ham, Japheth

HAM

- Descendants moved to the southwest (Four of Sons)
 - Cush Ethiopia
 - Mizraim Egypt
 - Phut Unknown (possibly areas of Africa west of Egypt)
 - Canaan Settled in the land of Canaan. God later took away this land from Canaan and gave it to the Israelites (Shem)

Sons of Noah Shem, Ham, Japheth

SHEM

- Remained in the valley of Mesopotamia while others moved to Arabia
- Elam, Assyria, Babylon are all of Semitic origin
 - City-states of Aram and the Arabian tribes all fit into this same family group

Sons of Noah Shem, Ham, Japheth

SHEM

- Israelites, Moabites, Ammonites and Edomites are all small nations coming from Shem
 - We will study Shem's descendants more closely in future lessons since the Bible story deals with them the most

Early History of Nations

- As time passed, the population was no longer divided according to which son of Noah was the ancestor
 - Distinct nations arose which fought against their neighbors and took their territories

Early History of Nations


- The terms Hamitic (descendants of Ham) and Semitic (descendants of Shem) take on new connotations
 - Japheth's descendants moved in directions away from their brethren establishing their own culture and language
 - Most of Ham's descendants moved into Africa and developed their own culture and language

Early History of Nations

- Notice now a mixing of peoples between the Zagros Mountains and the Mediterranean Sea
 - As one tribe subdued another and as they lived close together, they absorbed many of the same cultural and language patterns

A Diverse Group of People

- Languages were related – now called Semitic in contrast to the Hamitic people of Africa
 - Semitic refers to the common patterns in their languages and life rather than blood lines





Promises To Abraham


- Many people were in existence by 2,000 B.C.


Abraham - Called to Serve

- Since Creation God blessed the righteous and showed disfavor to the wicked
- God chose one man to fulfill His purpose
 - He called Abram, later called Abraham and told him to leave his family and to go to a new land
 - Abraham (Genesis 17:5)
 - Go to a new land (Genesis 12:1)

Genesis 17:5

5 No longer shall your name be called Abram, but your name shall be Abraham, for I have made you the father of a multitude of nations.






Abraham - Called to Serve

- Ur of the Chaldeans
 - A city state of Sumer in the Mesopotamia Valley
 - He left his home in obedience to God (Hebrews 11:8-10)
 - Traveled approximately 600 miles until he reached Haran
 - Abraham's brother, Nahor, settled there permanently

Abraham - Called to Serve

 1900-2000 years before Christ, God told Abraham to leave Ur

Abraham – To Canaan

- Exact route that Abraham took from Haran to Canaan is uncertain
 - Probably traveled the trade routes of the day
 - At Damascus he had at least three choices

Abraham – To Canaan

- Probably took the King's Highway on the eastern side of the Jordan River.
- Most logical because his first camping place in the land was at Shechem located in the center of the land
- Most likely he moved south from Damascus until he reached the Jabbok River and then turning west and crossing the Jordan on to Shechem

Three Promises:

- ✓ Nation
- ✓ Land
- ✓ One who would bless all nations

Genesis 22:1-18 **Hebrews** 11:17-19



The entire remaining portion of the Bible is the story of the fulfillment of these three promises:

"the nation, the land, and the One who would bless all nations"

- Land was inhabited by a group of tribes called the Canaanites or the Amorites (Genesis 10:6,15-19)
 - They worshiped the gods of fertility called
 Baal with his female counterpart Ashtaroth

The entire remaining portion of the Bible is the story of the fulfillment of these three promises:

"the nation, the land, and the One who would bless all nations"

- Abraham's wealth consisted largely of cattle and sheep
 - Would move up and down the land

Abraham

- From Shechem, he moved between Bethel and Ai (12:8)
- He then moved farther south camping on the edge of the Negeb (12:9)
- A famine came in the land and Abraham went to Egypt (12:10), then later returned to Bethel
