## The Greatest "Love Language" of All

- A. In *The Five Love Languages*, Gary Chapman suggests that there are five basic love languages—five ways to express love to others. "Each person has a primary love language that we must learn to speak if we want that person to feel loved."
  - 1. Words of affirmation: this language uses words to affirm other people.
  - 2. Acts of service: for these people, actions speak louder than words.
  - 3. Receiving gifts: for some people, what makes them feel most loved is to receive a gift.
  - 4. **Quality time**: this language is all about giving the other person your undivided attention.
  - 5. **Physical touch**: to this person, nothing speaks more deeply than appropriate touch.
- B. But God's revelation to mankind points us to something even greater—the ultimate source, the purest, highest, most profound "love language" of all.
