Not the Manger, But the Cross

A. The Baby Became A Man

- 1.) An important event that fulfilled promises (Luke 2:10-14; Gen 3:15)
- 2.) But the "man" Jesus is not as alluring to the world as is the "baby" (John 15:18)
 - a. At odds with worldly living (Matt. 7:21-23)
 - b. Called his disciples to live differently (Matt.5:27-27, 44, 38-42)
 - c. Did not conform to the way the world thought (Matt. 20:27-28)
 - d. Challenged the prominent and would-be wise (Matt.23:8-12)
 - e. Demanded single-minded devotion (Matt.6:24, 33)
 - f. Came to be hated by the world (1 John 1:9-11; Isa. 53:3-5)

B. He Became Exactly What we Needed

- 1.) He Emptied Himself (Phil. 2:7-8; John 10:18; Heb. 2:14; John 1:14)
- 2.) The perfect Savior (Heb.2:9-10)
- 3.) The perfect High Priest (Heb.2:17-18)
- 4.) The perfect Sacrifice (Heb. 10:5)
- 5.) Not just any man, the perfect man (2 Cor.5:21; 1 Pet.1:19; 2:22)
- 6.) He did it in the most humbling way (*Matt.*27:29-30, vs.26; *John* 19:23-24)

C. He Became the Exalted of God

- 1.) The name above all names (Phil.2:9-11; Rom.1:4)
- 2.) Lord of all things in all realms (*Matt.*28:18; *Eph.*1:22-23; *Col.*2:10)
- 3.) Salvation not just because He was born, but because of what He did (Heb.5:8-9; 1 Peter 3:18)
