## Respond to the Lord For the Sake of His Name

When we do not respond:
• Did we?
• Are we preoccupied?
• Are we opting to?
Are we being neglectful, self-centered, or rude?
<ul> <li>Are we intentionally using the opportunity to make some sort of a point?</li> </ul>
• Are we choosing to defiantly against the one who is seeking a response?
In many ways, it depends:
• is seeking a response?
Who am in relation to them?
• In this instance, what is the thing to do?
Pharaoh in <i>Exodus 5</i> provides a great example of the principle:
• "Who is the LORD?" (Exo 5:1-2a)
• "Who is the LORD, that I should his voice?" (Exo 5:2b)
• "Moreover, I will not." (Exo 5:2c)
Throughout the Bible, we find God seeking a response:
• From Adam and Eve: "?" (Gen 3:9)
• From Cain: "?" (Gen 4:10)
• From Job: "?" ( <i>Job 38:1-2</i> )
• From all of his people: "?" ( <i>Isa 55:2-3</i> )
The point: He still seeks a response - for our good and for the sake of his name (Psa 23:1-3; 31:3; 79:9; Rom 1:4-5)
• Have I heard? (Rom 10:14-17)
• Am I? (Mark 4:18-19)
Am I opting to ignore? (Acts 17:28-32)
Am I being, self-centered, or rude? (Rom 1:21)
• Am I intentionally using the opportunity to make some sort of a point? (Exo 5:2)
Am I choosing to defiantly rebel? (Matt 21:28-29)
• Will I respond as I, for my good, and for the sake of his name? (1 Sam 3:9)
