## When We Pray in Jesus' Name

- A. What does it mean to pray "in Jesus' name"?
  - 1. It is a principle and a privilege revealed by \_\_\_\_\_ himself.
    - a. "Whatever you ask in my name..." (John 14:12-14)
    - b. "...whatever you ask the Father in my name..." (John 15:16)
    - c. "...whatever you ask of the Father in my name..." (John 16:20-24)
  - 2. It is a principle and a privilege built on the blessings of \_\_\_\_\_\_ with Jesus.
    - a. "...that by believing you may have life in his name" (John 20:30-31).
    - b. "...no other name under heaven given among men by which we must be saved" (Acts 4:12).
  - 3. Therefore, Christians are charged:
    - A. Let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts (Col 3:15)
    - B. Let the word of Christ dwell in your minds (Col 3:16)
    - C. Let all of your actions be defined by "the name of the Lord Jesus" (Col 3:17)
- B. Very evidently, "in Jesus' name" isn't a magic phrase. It *is* a reminding, defining, centering, leading, empowering, fueling phrase which brings us into orbit with God's will (*1 John 5:5-15*)

## When We Pray in Jesus' Name:

- We must pray \_\_\_\_\_. We have the opportunity to approach God because of Jesus' life, Jesus' work, Jesus' death, Jesus' resurrection, Jesus' accomplishments, Jesus' ongoing intercession (*Heb 10:5-22*).
- We should pray \_\_\_\_\_\_. We have the opportunity to draw near to the throne of grace because of Jesus' service as our great, perfect, sympathizing high priest in heaven (*Heb 4:14-16*).
- We can pray \_\_\_\_\_\_. We have the opportunity to be heard by our friend, our brother, our fellow heir (*John 15:12-15; Heb 2:9-18; Rom 8:12-17*).

## Conclusion:

- A. We run across "\_\_\_\_\_" 52 times in Scripture, a word which means "May it be, so be it, truly."
  - 1. It's a means of expressing agreement and personalizing something that has been read or heard (1 Cor 14:15-16).
  - 2. It's the last word in Romans, 1 Corinthians, Galatians, 2 Peter, Jude, and Revelation.
- B. In light of everything you've heard this morning, can you truly say, "Amen"?
