- A. A major part of God's unchanging nature is that he keeps his promises.
- B. It was because of a promise of God that Elijah came on the biblical scene in the first place.
- C. In 1 Kings 18:1, we find a promise of God that the people had been waiting on for a long time.

- A. The Bible is full of promises—an estimated 7,500!
- B. A question worth pondering: "Can we claim every one of those promises personally?"
- C. Not all promises found in the Bible are for us to claim-into which category does it fall?
 - 1. Is it one of those **specific** promises that was meant for a *unique* situation?
 - 2. Is it one of those general promises that was meant for universal application?
 - 3. Check the context!
 - 4. Examples of promises to **specific** individuals in *unique* situations.

 - b. Mark 16:18 Jesus' promise to his apostles.
 - 5. Examples of universal promises we are encouraged to joyfully claim.
